In the last year the South Miami Police Department achieved the following accomplishments:

- ◆ The patrol vehicle fleet began a transformation with the purchase of new and different police vehicles.
- ◆ The Ford "Crown Victoria-Police Inceptor," the favored police model for law enforcement all over the country, has been replaced by Ford with the new "Taurus-Police Interceptor." The Police Interceptor will provide better fuel efficiency and offer a more technologically advanced vehicle for officers to operate.
- ◆ Approved the redesigning and the striping of our police cars to increase their visibility while making them unique from the designs of other agencies.
- ◆ Approved the purchase of new police bicycles in order to help increase our visibility in businesses and residential neighborhoods.
- ◆ Worked with local leaders, citizens and clergy to reduce incidents of gun violence plaguing South Florida and more specifically South Miami.
- ◆ Implemented staff walks in both our business and residential areas which enhanced our community contacts.
- ◆ Conducted Active Shooter training at Sunset Place, local schools and businesses.
- ◆ Also created a Facebook and Twitter initiative in order to enhance our outreach to the public.
- ◆ Instituted a History Wall Project which enhanced our station beautification and honored those past and present officers that have dedicated their services to the South Miami Police Department.





Crime does not stand still and neither does a professional law enforcement agency when the face of that crime changes. By delivering timely and professional services to the public, we further solidify our allegiance to the public service promise we vowed to uphold.


In 2013, our Total Violent Crimes, like in many nearby communities, saw an increase. While the increase was 2.1 %, this represented an increase by only two (2) incidents. Non-violent crimes showed an increase of 6.8% . Overall Index crime showed an increase of 6.9% for the year.

To counter these rising rates, the police department began a series of initiatives to confront the crimes, raise citizen awareness of crime prevention techniques, and target known offenders. The department showed an increase of 19.8% in arrests and an overall case clearance rate of 15.2%.


Through closer partnerships we have forged with citizens, merchants and organizations, the South Miami Police Department hopes to keep this the “City of Pleasant Living”.




VIOLENT CRIMES

ARRESTS



The Uniform Patrol Division is part of the Operations Bureau and the largest division within the South Miami Police Department. The division is responsible for the uniformed patrol functions of the department which includes; 24-hour response to calls and/or initial investigation of crimes, incidents, traffic complaints, vehicle crashes, enforcement activities, medical emergencies, and crime prevention activities.

The Division is comprised of the following specialized units:

- Traffic Enforcement Unit (Motorcycles Officers);
- Canine (K-9) Unit;
- Community Policing Unit;

The Division also has the following specialized teams:

- Honor Guard Team;
- Field Training Officer (F.T.O.) Team;
- Crisis Intervention Team (C.I.T.) and;
- Bike Patrol Team.



The Division is committed to deliver exceptional community policing methods through the use of personalized service, bicycle patrols, walking beats, community outreach initiatives, and officers strategically assigned to the Community Redevelopment Area for increased problem solving initiatives and community partnership.

The Uniform Patrol Division trains for all facets of its responsibilities to serve its community with the most professional and attentive personnel found within the Law Enforcement community. Commonly referred to as the "Thin Blue Line" the men and women of the Uniform Patrol Division work to protect the residents, visitors and business owners of this community with pride and honor.

The following were statistical performances during 2013:

- 109 Felony Arrests**
- 291 Misdemeanor Arrests**
- 51 Traffic Arrests**
- 88 Warrants Served**
- 10,581 Traffic Citations Issued**
- 1,065 Traffic Citation PTA's**
- 1,118 Parking Citations**



The South Miami Police Department is no stranger to “Community Policing”. It has been delivering personalized service for decades. The department takes pride in knowing its residents and unique geographical needs. Currently, the department has a Community Policing Unit which consists of three members assigned to the Community Redevelopment Area (C.R.A). The Community Policing Unit focuses their efforts on identifying problems and working together with members of the community and the C.R.A. to address those problems. The officers respond to service calls and attend community meetings to share information with residents and business owners. In addition, they participate in community services like toy and food drives, crime prevention presentations, and safety enhancement campaigns.

COMMUNITY POLICING




The Criminal Investigations Division within the South Miami Police is responsible for conducting follow-up investigations as well as special investigations as defined in Department General Order 19.1. The division is divided into two units, General Investigations and Special Investigations. While each of these units has different job descriptions, each plays an intricate role in order for the division to function effectively.

General Investigations (GIU) is responsible for conducting follow-up investigations on criminal reports against persons and property which are filed by the public and not resolved by the Uniform Patrol Division. Detectives assigned to this unit, follow-up on leads in these cases in an attempt to bring them to a successful resolution. Detectives assigned to this unit are also responsible for the collection of evidence and the processing of crime scenes. Until October 2013, this unit was comprised of one lieutenant and three detectives. In order to make the unit and the division as whole perform more effectively, a sergeant and a fourth detective was added.

The following were statistical performances during 2013:

- 407 assigned cases to investigate. Of those cases, 159 were resolved, cleared, unfounded or cleared by arrest.
- Detectives processed a total of 56 crime scenes. There are still some cases pending awaiting lab results on evidence collected.
- Detectives recovered a total of \$83,250.00 in property.



The Special Investigations Unit is currently comprised of two detectives who are assigned to a Federal Task Force. These detectives also address and assist the General Investigation detectives in the handling of narcotic cases and other initiatives within the city. The South Miami Police Department is currently working on getting the department back to full staff in order to build this unit back up to four detectives. Once this accomplished, these two additional detectives will concentrate on eliminating criminal activity within the city. The detectives will work both in uniform and in a plain clothes capacity depending activities they are focusing on. Their focus will be primarily on narcotic offenses, burglaries, robberies and any other crime trends that may arise within the city.

The following are some of the accomplishments of the Special Investigations Unit:

- ◆ 48 subjects were arrested for illegal narcotic activities
- ◆ Seized and/or recovered \$16,673,570.00 worth of illegal narcotics
- ◆ Took eight firearms off the street
- ◆ Conducted 274 surveillance details




COMMUNICATIONS

Communications personnel monitor various complex public safety radio frequencies and operate a variety of communications equipment, including radio consoles, telephones and computer systems in this 24-hour facility. They operate two computer-aided dispatch systems, state & national computers that allow them access into certain confidential information, operate and review the security access system and the 32 live monitor security feeds, greet the public that walks into the lobby for assistance and functions as a records depository. They also receive and process calls from the public requesting routine police or emergency services. Here they determine the nature and location of incidents, classify the call as routine or a priority, dispatch police, fire or other emergency units as necessary and in accordance with established procedures.


After dispatching the initial call for service they maintain contact with all units on assignment, as well as, maintain status and location of police units. In addition, Communications Officers input and retrieve data quickly upon receiving requests from the units for information such as: vehicle registration, driving records, warrants and relays pertinent data.

During 2013, we received 10,409 calls for service. We also handled and/or processed 3,326 Incidents, Accidents and Arrest Reports and welcomed a new hire Probationary Communications Officer Jacqueline Marrero-Llosa who successfully complete a rigorous three month training program.



The Professional Compliance Section is responsible for internal affairs, training, recruitment, hiring and accreditation. This unit is responsible for ensuring that departmental personnel receive state mandated training as well as advanced training appropriate for their position, South Miami Police Officers participate in annual “Mobile Field Force Training” which is county wide training that prepares officers for real life disturbances or civil unrest. Several “Active Shooter” training exercises were also conducted.

In 2013, officers from the department attended 1697.5 hours of training, both in house and at specialized training facilities. In addition, forty applicants were processed for various positions within the police department. The background process consists of interviews, criminal history, fingerprints, psychological testing, polygraph and a complete medical exam, along with a complete review of the applicants personal and professional past.



The Services Division is comprised of five Units; the Property and Evidence Unit, the Quarter Master Unit, the Vehicle Fleet Management Unit, the Records Management Unit and the Accreditation Unit.

The Property and Evidence Unit is responsible for the storage and safekeeping of all abandoned, lost and recovered property that are found by and/ or that are reported to the police department's personnel. Also impounded and stored are evidentiary items such as weapons, narcotics, latent finger prints, D.N.A. specimens, etc. All evidentiary items are properly handled and documented to assist in the successful prosecution of persons arrested for crimes committed by them. The following is the 2013 statistical performance of the Property and Evidence Unit;

- 429 items were impounded
- 67 items were destroyed (no evidentiary value)
- 54 items were returned to their owners
- 19 items were turned over to the City



The Quarter Master Unit is responsible for assigning all police department personnel their duty equipment. Police necessities change. That change is sometimes dictated by trends (crimes/modern policing) and/or equipment improvements. This unit is also responsible for researching specific needs, changes, pricing, etc. and then making informed recommendations to The Chief of Police for his approval. All duty equipment is properly documented, accounted for and assigned as needed.

The Vehicle Fleet Management Unit is responsible for maintaining a capable and professional fleet of police vehicles. From police administrators, to uniformed police officers and from general investigators to undercover operatives, this unit keeps inventories of all of the officer assigned vehicles as well as those vehicles assigned to all spare fleets. Both newly acquired and tenured vehicles are outfitted with state of the art emergency equipment and are maintained at a condition suitable for the rigors of modern police work. This year the police department added six vehicles to its fleet.

The Records Management Unit maintains all police offense / incident and crash reports. This unit is responsible for the storage of all departmental documents and the disposal of departmental records in accordance with the State of Florida's retention laws.



The South Miami Police Department has been working for the last three years to become an accredited agency with the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (C.F.A.). This prestigious certification is only given to police departments that have demonstrated they uphold the highest standards of professionalism in law enforcement. The Accreditation Unit is responsible to see that the police department succeeds in passing its initial on-site assessment, as well as ensuring that it continues these practices to maintain that status with inspections every three years.

The Accreditation process requires continual training courses and meetings, gathering information of current and future standards, and ensuring that the Police Department is running its day to day operation in compliance with its own policies and procedures, State of Florida Laws, and under the professional guidelines and standards set by the C.F.A.

The Accreditation Unit is tasked with maintaining all files needed to prove compliance with the Commission standards. These are presented during in depth C.F.A. on-site inspections where:

- Officers are interviewed

- Facilities inspected, and

- The overall operations of the Department are put “under the microscope.”

The Accreditation Unit worked vigorously alongside the men and women of the South Miami Police Department toward the goal of making this one of the best law enforcement agencies in Florida, in order to better serve the citizens and visitors of the City of South Miami.

As a result of their hard work and dedication, the South Miami Police Department has passed its final on-site C.F.A. assessment and should receive full Accreditation at the next meeting of the full Board of Commissioners of the C.F.A. in February 2014.

Sergeant Joseph O. Kephart in the 70's was the department's Supervisor of Identification, Shift Commander and the Firearms Training and Range Officer.




Officer L. Daniel Schulz in the late 80's while assigned to the Motor Unit

In memory of Fallen Officer L. Daniel Schulz...


Officer Schulz died in the line of duty 24 years ago after being stabbed while working an off duty job.

On October 15, 1987 Officer Schulz attempted to arrest a juvenile who was part of a gang which had been causing problems at the Bakery Centre movie theater. As he was taking the subject into custody, he was stabbed four times by the other members of the gang.

Officer Schulz succumbed to his injuries on November 27, 1987.
